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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We would like to call
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    the Franklin County Board of Elections meeting to
    order and I'll do the roll call.

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                 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Zachary Manifold?
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                 BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Here.
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                DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Douglas Preisse?
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.
                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And Brad Sinnott. I
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    almost said --
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                 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: You almost said
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    Michael Colley?
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah, almost.
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                 (Laughter.)
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                 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: I'm here,
    Mr. Director.
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All right. Thank you.
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                 The first item on the agenda would be to
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    approve the minutes of the October 1st and October
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     15th meeting.
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BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Mr. Chairman, I move the Board approve the minutes of the October

1st and October 15th meetings of the Franklin County
Board of Elections as submitted.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor?

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That motion carries, Mr. Chairman.

The next item on the agenda is we need to transfer some funds for additional security for the sheriff's office.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Possibly.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Possibly, yeah. We had them funded through Election Day and if there's a recount or, you know, we don't know the results and we may still have live ballots, still have live ballots after all of the provisional stuff is done, then we may need additional sheriff security at this facility and at the warehouse and to the tune not to exceed \$79,000.

If there's not a recount, then, of course, we won't use that money, but this is in the

event that there's a recount. So we didn't include it in the initial request so we're including it now and we will transfer that money from another portion of our budget. Any questions?

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: We would send the money over only as needed and on a pay-as-you-go basis?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We would encumber the money and have it already to go and if we don't use it, they don't get it.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And, you know, this -we didn't do this in 2008 or 2010, they would just be
made available and they would figure out where to get
the money from the Commissioners, but now we have to
encumber the money so that they can have the money in
the event that they need the money.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Very good.

Well, Mr. Chairman, I move that the Board authorize the Director and Deputy Director to transfer an amount of up to \$79,000 from the Board of Elections budget to the Franklin County Sheriff if additional security is necessary for the Board of Elections after Election Day.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor,

say aye.

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The next item on the agenda is we're spending money for this election and the office of management and budget, I think that's right, or budget and management, I get them wrong.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: I think it's actually the auditor's office --

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah. And we have to have policies, and I have those before you, to be able to reimburse some of our employees or to be able to purchase items that we need. And we have before you two proposed policies; one is the media purchases and campaigns. Take a little time to kind of read that.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: That policy is for the advertising that we do before a major general election like this year in which we advertised to the public our early vote options both by mail and in person and the spots we've been running this last week on types of identification to bring to the polls

with them.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: We just have to have something in writing.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Correct. That's correct.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And the second one is for poll worker recruitment. We do a lot of effort in that regard, reaching out to the corporate community, other employers, government employers to try to get poll workers and there's a cost to it. We have to produce brochures. We have a unique display unit that we take out with us and a lot of other ancillary expenses dealing with that.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: One specific one is with our Youth at the Booth program that we do through Kids Voting of Central Ohio who provided us — who will be providing us on Election Day tomorrow with about 1,400 poll workers. We do T-shirts for those students who are serving as poll workers for us that identify them as Youth at the Booth students. So anything that's in here in addition to what Director Anthony talked about is the purchase of those T-shirts that identify the Youth at the Booth at the polling locations because we want them

recognized as poll workers just like any other poll worker out there to identify them to the public when they come in that they are our poll workers.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I move the Board adopt the poll worker recruitment purchases policies developed by the Board of Elections staff.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor?

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Mr. Chairman, that motion carries as well.

The next item on the agenda is the remaking of absentee ballots. We have two of our guys here, Gene Shell and Howard Heard, if you have any questions. But every year -- I mean, every election cycle we have to remake ballots for a number of reasons: One, they may have gone through the mail and the mail jacked them up, messed them up, or the voter's intent isn't -- they may have circled it instead of covering it in, and our machine will not count those.

So we have teams of Democrats and Republicans that look at these ballots and then we

remake them based on the two bipartisan teams looking at the ballot. And if it could be determined, without a doubt, the voter's intent, they'll remake the ballot. Those that they can't figure out, they'll bring here and the Board will make that determination and the Board will actually meet when we go to count those all up.

But Gene and Howard are here and they can show you what one looks like if you would like to see it.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Sure.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Why don't you bring some of them up so they can take a look at them.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: There are sort of two categories of these: One is where the ballot might be soiled in some way, somebody spilled coffee on it or tore it or something like that and it won't go through the reader; the other category is where they might have put an X through the oval instead of filling the oval in, but the voter intent is very clear.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What would happen if you did try to read it?

MR. SHELL: It would not because it would

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get kicked out as an indeterminate ballot.
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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: This has actually already been counted.

MR. SHELL: It's been tried to go through the machine, but it kicked it out as indeterminate based on the colorings that's in the bubbled area and that makes one of the humans on the machine look at the ballot to see why it's indeterminate.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Show us one that was marked differently.

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: He's got one over here.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: That was marked -- CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You know, that

15 | wasn't --

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Why don't you show the check mark one; that was a good one.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I might add, we do this every election cycle, but every election cycle we have to bring them before the Board and have you guys vote on it.

MR. SHELL: Something like that is another one where it gets wet and the paper will not go through the machine because it expands due to the

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liquid that hits the ballot.
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BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: So Howard, Gene, what will happen if the bipartisan staff team agrees about what the voter's intent was, you'll process that ballot on the basis of that agreement.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We will remake the ballot. We will actually remake the ballot.

MR. SHELL: And that's for it to be included in the unofficial count for Tuesday night.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: And if the bipartisan staff team can't agree, then you'll carry those to the Board members and we'll see if we can agree, correct?

MR. SHELL: That's correct.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And the soiled ballot will be with the original ballot.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: That's correct.

We will be coming back to you after the election

because we always get some that are cast on Election

Day, a provisional maybe that gets cast on Election

Day or something like that, or a mailed-in absentee

that comes in that was postmarked by Election Day and

received after that is the same sort of thing. So

after the election we will have some additional ones

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    that we will be bringing before the Board.

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DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The next item on the agenda is provisional ballots and each election cycle we have to come before you guys to give me and Dana and our staff the ability to basically verify the provisional ballots. Again, we go through that process, we take these provisional ballots and we

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check them, check them twice, sometimes three times or more to verify the information on there.

And, again, we need to be able to do that or you guys would be sitting and looking at about close to a thousand, looking through each one of them, so we make your job a little easier. And those that we can't agree on or we don't know what to do with them, we'll again bring them before this Board. At no time will these ballots be counted until we're allowed to count them; we're just getting them ready to be counted.

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Mr. Chairman, I move that the Board authorize the Director and Deputy Director to appoint bipartisan teams of employees to begin the process of verifying provisional ballots cast at the General Election and that no provisional ballots shall be approved for counting without Board approval.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor,

say aye.

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, that

passes.

The next item on the agenda is we have to open the polls officially and that's what we would like you guys to do since they open up tomorrow morning at 6:30 a.m. sharp. So that's what the next one is. We'll be open from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. And we have all set our clocks back and we are ready.

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Mr. Chairman, I move that the polls be declared open for the Tuesday, November 6th, 2012 Primary Election --

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: General election.

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Oh, wow. That's what I get. Start over.

Mr. Chairman, I move that the polls be declared open for the Tuesday, November 6th, 2012 General Election beginning at 6:30 a.m. and closing at 7:30 p.m., and that in accordance with Section 3501.32, any voter in line prior to the close of the polls at 7:30 p.m. shall be permitted to vote.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor,

say aye.

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That motion carries

also.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Before we get to the final note on here, if we could, we wanted to bring to the attention of the Board that there were and I think there might be a few folks who are here today on this matter. There were a number of amended appointments made by a group who had originally appointed some observers. Some candidates asked to be withdrawn as the committee on — associated with that group.

We subsequently received some amended appointments to that original appointment. It is our opinion that we will be adhering to the original appointment of those observers on Election Day, but that because of the withdrawal of the candidates who wish to be part of that after the initial filing had been made, that the subsequent filing of amended observers will not be accepted by the Board.

And I will be contacting, Bill and I, after this meeting, will be contacting the organization who did this to alert them that we are not accepting their amended observer appointments for tomorrow's election.

Any questions on that? Mr. Chairman?

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: The issue that -- Mr. Chairman, if I might?
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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Go ahead, please.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: The issue that was in play here was the fact that the appointment came in prior to the candidates withdrawing their support for that, and the code does not provide for a mechanism of withdrawing an appointment once it has been made in this instance. The law is silent on withdrawing an appointment once it has been made.

MS. HOKE: Is this not a policy concern for the future? I mean --

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We are acting as our counsel interprets and advises as it relates to the Revised Code. We don't create the Revised Code, but we operate under it, and I don't think we need a policy beyond what we've been advised. So I would presume going in the future that would be our approach unless the legislature changes the Revised Code.

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: I think -- I'll just give some background real quick, Mr. Chairman.

I found out this -- this weekend was the first time I saw the amended filings and I brought it to the

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    Board's attention. I was just concerned because --
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    because I knew that, you know, this group had the
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    first signing or filing, I think October 1st or
    October 2nd. I saw and I know that they'd all pulled
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    their names off and then there was this amendment

And I think, you know, as far as the original signing, I think, as the Chairman said, I think we're basically, you know, locked in, we can't do anything about it, I think once it's filed and even if they pulled out there's not a mechanism to allow that observer appointment to be pulled.

The better case might have been for those candidates to come together and amend that document and delete all those people from being appointed in the first place would have probably been a better --

MR. ANDERSON: Right.

MS. SHAFFER: I was invited to several of the True the Vote meetings when they did the planning on this and the plans for this are not for a harmonious polling location. Things were discussed like using cameras to intimidate voters as they come in. Their plans were to have iPads that they're able to, as the voter is coming in, what was described to me was that they were gonna be there overlooking into the book and they're going to get the voter's information that's coming and they're planning to send it in to some central location and be able to try and stop between the poll worker going through and getting the voter in the book and their voter

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ticket number and stuff, they're planning to be able to stop the voter between that and walking to a machine.
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You can't tell me how this is going to add to a harmonious polling location. You're going to have problems galore. And I'd be happy to tell you further about these meetings because I was invited to a bunch.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. The behavior you describe is, of course, as we all know or should know and know, is specifically and expressly prohibited, so we're not going to permit that and the staff is not going to permit that kind of activity to take place at any polling place. And now we have to move on.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The next item -CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Unless the Board wants
to say anything.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The last item on the agenda is a recess. You have to vote to go into recess subject to a recall from the Chair, so we need a motion to that effect.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: That's right.
