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4 1 2 PROCEEDINGS 4 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All right. I'd like 5 to call the Franklin County Board of Elections 6 meeting to order. 7 BOARD MEMBER HAAS: Do you want him to 8 come up? DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Do we want to swear 9 him in before the roll call? 10 11 MS. BROWN: I'm sorry, what? DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Do we want to swear 12 13 him in before the roll call? MS. BROWN: Yeah, you can do that. 14 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: So the first thing I'm 15 going to do is swear in our newest board member. 16 17 Judge Barrows, if you will do the honors. 18 (Thereupon, Mr. Haas was sworn in as a board member of the Franklin County Board of 19 Elections.) 20 21 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All right. Again, I 2.2 would like to call the Franklin County Board of 23 Elections meeting to order. I will do the roll call. Kimberly Marinello? 24

5 1 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Here. 2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Gregory Haas? BOARD MEMBER HAAS: Here. 4 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Douglas Preisse? 5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here. 6 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Bradley Sinnott? 7 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Here. 8 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Mr. Chairman, we have 9 a full-fledged board and are all here and present. 10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, we welcome our 11 newest board member and, with that, I think we can 12 proceed to the agenda. 13 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The first item on the 14 agenda is the approval of the minutes from the 15 October 7th board meeting. 16 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I 17 move the Board approve the minutes of the 18 October 7th, 2013 meeting of the Franklin County Board of Elections as submitted. 19 20 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Second. DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor? 21 2.2 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 2.3 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I'm passing that down

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for everybody to sign.

The second order on the agenda will be we have Mr. Bob Hart in the audience that wants to do a presentation to the Board regarding sufficiency and validity of petitions.

Mr. Hart.

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MR. HART: Thank you, Mr. Director.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Can we -- I'm sorry.

MR. HART: I'm sorry.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Mr. Hart, in the interest of organization and time, you're going to address the Board on an issue of interest and importance to you, I take it, that you've been working on as to petitions and checking the petitions. Normally, we set some time frames of several minutes, let's say five to eight minutes.

MR. HART: It will take no longer than that, I assure you.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And then there may be questions and answers. I think for the record if you state your name and title and that will help.

MR. HART: Very good. Thank you.

My name is Robert M. Hart, H-a-r-t. I'm currently a candidate running for U.S. Congress in the 12th Congressional District. I live in

Worthington, Franklin County, Ohio. And I appear before the Board, and I appreciate Ms. Brown putting me on the agenda today and circulating amongst you the topic of my request here today which is a directive that was adopted by this Board on September 10th of 2007.

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This is a directive that indicates that the employees of the local — of the Franklin County Board of Elections are precluded from checking or reviewing declarations of candidacy, nominating petitions, and local option petitions for validity and sufficiency prior to the filing deadline. The filing deadline in this case would be in early February, I believe February 5th or 6th if I recall the 2014 candidates' calender correctly.

I have filed my nominating petitions on October 11th of this year, have paid my filing fee, have done all the requisite state requirements and local requirements for declaring my candidacy. I've also registered with the Federal Election Commission, gotten my EIN, opened my bank account.

I then inquired to Mr. Mackey as to when the petitions on my nominating petitions would be verified and he indicated that this directive was in

place. He provided a copy. I'm here to request the reconsideration of the Board of this policy.

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And I will tell you, and I apologize, I don't know the reasoning behind it, I was unable to take the time to research what the minutes might have shown in 2007. What I can tell you, though, is that it is of a benefit to a candidate running for Congress to know as soon as possible whether or not their nominating petitions have qualified them to make them ballot qualified.

There is a difference from kind of a

First Amendment perspective when you're recruiting

potential volunteers or asking for contributions

whether or not you're able to say I'm ballot

qualified per the Franklin County Board of Elections

or I'm awaiting for that process to happen.

And given that that process is now several months away, from my perspective that puts me at a little bit of a disadvantage on the campaign front because I'm unable to say, as an attorney I would not say that I'm ballot qualified or I'm qualified by the Franklin County Board of Elections until such time that you've indicated to me that you've verified my petition and in fact I have

qualified under the applicable law.

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So I'm asking this Board to reconsider this policy. I'm asking the Board to go ahead and permit its employees or direct its employees to verify the signatures on my petition. There's 35 signatures. They are all Franklin County. I have tried to verify myself, but of course that doesn't suffice for ballot access.

Thank you very much. If you have any questions, I'll be happy to answer them.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you for that succinct recitation of your concerns and issues.

Are there questions that the Board members may have or comments that the staff or legal counsel may wish to make as it relates to what the Board decided in September of 2007 would be our policy?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: It was -Mr. Chairman, it was prior to my time here and,
Mr. Director, correct me if I'm wrong, but I believe
that the rationale behind this was to bring
consistency to this process and an even field for
everybody and so that nobody thought anything was
prequalified or anything like that prior to such time

as we had all candidates before the members of the Board to set the ballot.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: As I recall, somebody got information, another person didn't get the same information and there was a big hullabaloo, and then somebody got bad information. So just to have a standard practice so that everybody is fair and equal that's how we came up with that.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Part of my reading, that was awhile back, but part of it has to do with the staffing too. There is, when you fill out a petition, when you have that filing, there's a deadline for the completion of the filing. And then, particularly between now and the next election, our staff then gets busy doing the other stuff that they're supposed to be doing to make sure elections are done properly.

And so, we cut off, we decided not to, you know, while we were in the process of preparing for an election, that petition folks, if you know the filing deadline is say in February, we're not going to check any of this stuff until the

filing deadline.

accepted.

And as Kim said, you know, once it's filed we're not going to -- we're not going to do any -- we're not going to check it, we don't even accept them until the filing deadline, because for us it does add that consistency and it does make it easier for our staff not to try to keep track of all of this, all of the petitions that are coming through.

I understand what you're saying, but -MR. HART: Actually, they've been
accepted. I have a time-stamped copy.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah, well -MR. HART: These have been filed and

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Well, we do -- we do accept them, but we don't go through the process and of going through and verifying until that deadline.

And part of the reason is because it does put everybody on a level footing, you know, when that deadline comes then we start checking the petitions.

We don't do it prior to. So we don't have any of our staff pre-looking at petitions to see if they have enough signatures and all that. It's the day of we start checking.

MR. HART: Yeah. And I thoroughly understand the other part of this rule which I did not read which is you do not actually check anybody's signatures prior to them filing, and I appreciate the fairness in that policy and I understand kind of the generic sense of a level-playing field.

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My point is to encourage you to consider the impact it has on my ability as a candidate to say with all honesty that I'm ballot qualified and so it does have some First Amendment implications for me.

And, as an attorney, I certainly don't want to commit anything unethical by suggesting I'm ballot qualified when I'm not.

And I would perfectly understand that if you're preparing for, for example, tomorrow's election and I'm an earlier filer, you wouldn't take that time to do it, but after this election is certified and still well before the February deadline, it strikes me that it could be done without negatively impacting staff in terms of its ability to perform the other required tasks. So that's the basis. It has to do with what I'm permitted to say to potential --

-- did you want to --

BOARD MEMBER HAAS: You know, I am having a little trouble understanding the practical problem, because, I mean, this is, you know, very informal in terms of the comment, but, you know, the difference between being a filed candidate --

MR. HART: Right.

BOARD MEMBER HAAS: -- and being somebody who is prefiled and when you can tell people that and you're that far in front of the election, I don't think -- do you run into a lot of people who say, "Oh, well, you're not officially on the ballot yet, so" --

MR. HART: I'm a minor political party candidate and it makes all the difference in the world versus the two major candidates who have significant machinery and operatives who are out doing this. So, for me, it does make a significant difference because I am a minor candidate. The longer I have with the best information I can give to potential contributors and volunteers is important from my perspective. But I understand your point, you know, I understand your point, but that's kind of my perspective.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Thank you, sir.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Chairman, I'm curious as to whether anyone on the Board knows if there's a Secretary of State directive or other instruction on the subject?

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DIRECTOR ANTHONY: You know, I'm not sure, but we, you know, what has happened and part of the reason we passed this was that if folks start coming in and try to pre-do everything and we was getting -- our staff was kind of helping some folks --

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Yeah

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: -- and not helping some folks. So we set the policy you don't mess with these until the deadline and all you do is accept them. You don't -- you don't go by and try to look at them to make sure that the filer has --

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: The signature and --

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah. We don't do any of that because part of what happened was that we had some petitions where folks who came in and pre-done it or filed it early and made assertions that our staff had told them that everything they had was

correct, that they had looked at it, they reviewed it and then it wasn't correct and so they wanted to be on the ballot anyway because they said it was our clerical error and not their error.

And so, to help alleviate and that's what's the other part of it now that I'm recalling, to help alleviate that problem, we said we will not start checking any petitions until the deadline. And that alleviates all the problems of someone coming in and saying, "Well, I forgot to sign my name, can I have my petition back," or, "Can you check this and make sure I've signed my name on it correctly?" And so that's why we do not check anything until that deadline date has occurred, then we then start processing.

MR. HART: In response to the Board member's question, there is no Secretary of State directive.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No --

MR. HART: -- that I could locate.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: -- there's not. But that was our policy. As a matter of fact, other boards across the state have adopted a similar policy because they were having the same problem. It keeps

our staff from having that problem of "You told me my 1 petition was okay and it's not okay now," and so --2 3 MR. HART: Wouldn't you have that problem 4 regardless of when they're verified? 5 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No, but if the 6 deadline is -- if we don't start checking the petition until the deadline, they're time stamped, 8 they're in our hands, and they are what they are at that point. And there's no, "You looked at mine, you 9 10 know, on Wednesday before the deadline --11 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Yeah. 12 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: -- and I need to add 13 10 more signatures because of whatever, " so. 14 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: But you are, it 15 says you can go to the -- check them yourself at the --16 17 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: At the counter. 18 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: -- at the counter in the back there. 19 20 MR. HART: I've already done that, but I 21 cannot represent that I'm ballot qualified --2.2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No, you're not. 2.3 MR. HART: -- until you check them. I've 24 checked them. They're all valid.

1 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Well, you can be 2 confident in your mind. MR. HART: It takes 15 minutes to check 3 4 35 signatures. 5 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Yeah. 6 MR. HART: They're all Franklin County. 7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think -- Mr. Hart, 8 thank you for sharing with us your perspective. think without a motion from a member of the Board, 9 10 there's nothing for us to do but welcome you to supply further written information or precedent you 11 might find. 12 13 MR. HART: Very good. Thank you very 14 much. Ms. Brown, thank you. 15 MS. BROWN: Thank you. 16 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Thank you. 17 MR. HART: Director, thank you as well. DIRECTOR ANTHONY: You're welcome. 18 19 you, sir. 20 The next item on the agenda is the remake 21 of any absentee ballots. 2.2 Todd, do you have some ballots that will need to be remade? 23 MR. WEDEKIND: Yes. 24

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Todd Wedekind.

MR. WEDEKIND: We have 22 ballots that will need to be remade for the unofficial canvass due to what appears to be water damage so the ballots won't run through the scanners, so we have to make new ones.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Todd, are they all the same? They're all water-damaged ballots?

MR. WEDEKIND: Yeah, these are. These

are all just because they got wet.

members of the Board, you know, the practice on this is that we have bipartisan teams who will sit down together, one reads the ballot off and the other will mark the ballot and both be in unison. If there's any discrepancy on any of them, then we will certainly bring them back to the Board for final determination on them which is our standard procedure on this.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Our equipment -
MR. WEDEKIND: So they get wrinkled and
the thickness is compromised and it detects something
thicker than it's supposed to be.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: So we can't run

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them through the machine.
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FROM THE FLOOR: We attempted to and they wouldn't go through the machine. They jammed up.

And based on what we looked at on the paper, it's too thick to go through the scanner.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Fair enough. Mr. Chairman, I move the Board authorize the staff to remake 22 absentee paper ballots and that these remade ballots shall be tabulated and included in the unofficial canvass on election night.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

BOARD MEMBER HAAS: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor?

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The motion carries.

Mr. Chairman, we had a late withdrawal from Dublin Ward 1. Who's here to talk about that?

Is Mackey here? We had a candidate, Alexander

Schaffer --

FROM THE FLOOR: Would you like me to go qet Jeff?

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I don't know that we need him.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No, we don't need him.

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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We're sufficiently 1 2 informed of the circumstances. 3 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I 4 move that the Board accept the withdrawal of 5 Alexander Schaffer, candidate for Dublin Ward 1 City 6 Council, and that any votes cast for him at the November 5th, 2013 General Election shall not be 8 counted. 9 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second? 10 Is there a second? 11 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: There is, yes. 12 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Oh, I'm sorry. 13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What's the time stamp 14 on this letter? 15 MS. BROWN: Today. 16 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Today. 17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: It's today. 18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Oh, okay. I'm 19 misreading. It looks like 13. That's just the edge 20 of the stamp. 21 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah. 2.2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Yes. 23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Understood. 24 Excuse me.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor? 1 2 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 3 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Those opposed? 4 (No response.) 5 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The motion carries. 6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: And just for the members of the Board, we will -- we've already got it 7 8 in the works that notices are going out to be placed 9 at any polling location where Dublin Ward 1 is 10 located, so that there will be a notice put up for 11 the voters to identify that this candidate has 12 withdrawn. 13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is that --DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: As is normal 14 15 practice. CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Where is that notice 16 17 placed? 18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Right inside on the door of the voting machine, of each voting 19 machine. 20 21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Good. 2.2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The next item is a 23 personnel matter. We want to bring on Julia Jiner-Manifold to work in the Administrative 24

Department as a special projects coordinator, with her starting date November 11th, 2013.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I move the Board hire Julia Jiner-Manifold to a position in the Administrative Department beginning November 11th, 2013, at a salary of \$19.23 per hour.

BOARD MEMBER HAAS: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor?
BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The motion carries.

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3501.32, any voter in line prior to the close of the
