DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It looks like we have a full complement of Board members. We'll go ahead and start the meeting. We'll take roll.

Kim Marinello.

MS. MARINELLO: Here.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Michael Sexton.

MEMBER SEXTON: Here.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug Preisse.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad Sinnott.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Here.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We do have a quorum.

The first item on the agenda is the approval of minutes.

MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the Board approve the minutes of the May 7, 2018 meeting of the Franklin County Board of Elections

1 as submitted.

2 MS. MARINELLO: Second.

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All in favor
4 signify by saying aye.

5 (Vote taken.)

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
7 same sign.

8 (No response.)

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
10 carries.

11 The next two items on the agenda are
12 paper ballot allocation for the August 7th special
13 election and then voting machine and e-Poll book
14 allocation for the August 7th special election.
15 The Secretary of State requires us to look at these
16 on two separate occasions. This is the first of
17 those occasions where we'll authorize the use of
18 electronic poll books and the quantity and the same
19 with voting machines.

20 Carolyn, you want to go over that?

21 MS. GORUP: Carolyn Gorup,
22 G-o-r-u-p.

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Can we go
24 over paper ballots first?

25 MS. GORUP: Paper ballots first.

1 Okay.

2 Usually when we do paper ballots we
3 compare previous like-elections. There are no
4 previous like-elections to the special. We looked
5 at the primary. The most provisional ballots that
6 any one of these precincts had was 14. So after
7 some discussions we decided that using a full pad
8 of 25 in each location would meet the requirements
9 for the provisional ballots.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And if for
11 some reason we saw on election day that we were
12 exceeding that, we have the ability to print more
13 and deliver those.

14 MS. GORUP: Print more and send them
15 out.

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Great.

17 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move the Board
18 adopt the paper ballot allocation formula in
19 Exhibit A compiled by the Board staff for the
20 August 7th, 2018, special election.

21 MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
23 favor signify by saying aye.

24 (Vote taken.)

25 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,

1 same sign.

2 (No response.)

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
4 carries.

5 Voting machine and electronic poll
6 book allocation.

7 MS. GORUP: And I can guarantee you
8 this will change. We are still in the process of
9 contacting the polling locations. Churches have an
10 issue in the summer as do the recreational centers.
11 We know we're going to be moving -- temporarily
12 moving some, but to meet the requirements the
13 report you have in front of you shows the machine
14 allocation and the poll pad and allocations. Once
15 we get all the changes in, then we will recompute
16 all of this.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: But as of
18 today this is correct?

19 MS. GORUP: As of today this is
20 correct. And we are showing that we're going to
21 open the London Senior Center to vote maybe nine
22 voters. So that will get combined someplace.

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay.

24 MEMBER SEXTON: I move the Board
25 adopt the voting machine allocation formula in

1 Exhibit B compiled by the Board staff for the
2 August 7th, 2018, special election.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
5 properly moved and seconded.

6 All those in favor signify by saying
7 aye.

8 (Vote taken.)

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
10 same sign.

11 (No response.)

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
13 carries.

14 The next item on the agenda, we
15 would discuss some salary adjustments. Would it be
16 the pleasure of the Board to go into executive
17 session?

18 MEMBER SINNOTT: Pursuant to Ohio
19 Revised Code Section 121.22(G) (1) and (3), I move
20 that the Franklin County Board of Elections go into
21 executive session to consider the compensation of
22 public employees.

23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I believe
25 this requires a roll call.

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Kim Marinello.

MS. MARINELLO: Yes.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Michael
Sexton.

MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
Preisse.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad
Sinnott.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We are in
executive session.

(Board in executive session.)

MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
move the Franklin County Board of Elections adjourn
from executive session and that no votes or
official actions were taken during executive
session.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.

Kim Marinello.

MS. MARINELLO: Yes.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Michael
Sexton.

MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
2 Preisse.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Brad
5 Sinnott.

6 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We are out
8 of executive session.

9 If we want to talk about seasonal
10 worker wage adjustment discussion, Director, you
11 want to just say a word or two about that?

12 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yeah. What we
13 did was adjusted the seasonal salary scales that --
14 Some are weighted more towards the -- but it is a
15 weighted average -- to increase the lower ranges a
16 little bit more towards the upper ranges of that
17 scale. But it would affect all of our employees
18 that are brought on under the seasonal salary
19 scale.

20 MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the
21 Board adopt the seasonal salary scale increase in
22 Exhibit C beginning with the June 11th pay period.

23 MS. MARINELLO: Second.

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
25 favor signify by saying aye.

1 (Vote taken.)

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
3 same sign.

4 (No response.)

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
6 carries.

7 Next item that we discussed in
8 executive session was part-time and non-seasonal
9 worker wage adjustment.

10 Do you want to mention that?

11 DIRECTOR LEONARD: What was
12 presented was a schedule for those part-time
13 employees that we have at the Board of Elections
14 who on a regular basis work no more than 30 hours a
15 week and also some of our seasonal employees that
16 are not on the salary scale.

17 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move the Board
18 adopt the part-time non-seasonal salary increase in
19 Exhibit D beginning with June 11th pay period.

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
22 favor signify by saying aye.

23 (Vote taken.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
25 same sign.

1 (No response.)

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
3 carries.

4 And then, finally, poll worker
5 trainer wage adjustment.

6 DIRECTOR LEONARD: What we discussed
7 is that all the trainers that we employ at the
8 Board of Elections, that periodically they will
9 serve in roles other than their training function,
10 that they'll serve in some other capacity within
11 the office doing work to supplement our full-time
12 staff, and that in that role they ought to receive
13 an increase and recommend you increase that to the
14 rate they currently get.

15 MEMBER SEXTON: I move that the poll
16 worker training employees in a non-training role be
17 paid at a rate of \$15.30 per hour beginning with
18 the June 11th pay period.

19 DIRECTOR PREISSE: Second.

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
21 favor signify by saying aye.

22 (Vote taken.)

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
24 same sign.

25 (No response.)

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
2 carries.

3 There was discussion about Randy
4 Burley being promoted.

5 DIRECTOR LEONARD: As we mentioned,
6 this is -- Randy has taken on the role that Phil
7 Purkey had performed for us in the production mail
8 section of the office. He'll be working alongside
9 Seth Golding and the pay should be commensurate to
10 what Phil was making when he served in that role.

11 MEMBER SEXTON: I move that the
12 Franklin County Board of Elections adjust the
13 salary of Randy Burley to \$47,000 per year, that's
14 \$22.60 per hour, upon him assuming the position of
15 production mail clerk and that his pay be raised
16 retroactive to February 5th, 2018.

17 MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
19 favor signify by saying aye.

20 (Vote taken.)

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
22 same sign.

23 (No response.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
25 carries.

1 The other discussion item was
2 full-time employee salary adjustment.

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: We presented the
4 Board with Exhibit E which outlines the increases
5 or the new pay rates for each of the employees and
6 that the funds are available within our budget to
7 do so.

8 MEMBER SINNOTT: I move the Franklin
9 County Board of Elections adjust the salaries of
10 those full-time employees listed on Exhibit E and
11 that those salary adjustments be made retroactive
12 to the first pay period of 2018.

13 MEMBER SEXTON: Second.

14 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
15 favor signify by saying aye.

16 (Vote taken.)

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
18 same sign.

19 (No response.)

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
21 carries.

22 There were three items -- or
23 actually two items. One is if you remember we
24 talked about Prime/3SG and our redistricting or
25 looking at the districts in the 3rd, 12th, and the

1 15th to make sure that all of our voters were
2 assigned to the proper districts. At our last
3 meeting Board Member Sinnott mentioned that maybe
4 we ought to approach the auditor's office and see
5 if they are able to do anything close or similar to
6 what we were asking 3SG to do, and that turned out
7 to be a very good suggestion.

8 I've got emails here from the county
9 auditor. And I think it's the recommendation of
10 the director and myself that we pursue the county
11 auditor and have them do the work and that we reach
12 out to 3SG and tell them the situation we're in and
13 that the auditor is willing to do this for
14 basically nothing and if they would like to do the
15 same work for nothing -- I can't image they would
16 want to do that -- but if they would in order to
17 see like -- what do you call it? -- a
18 belt-and-suspenders approach so that we're double
19 covered and that if we saw one was better than the
20 other going into the fall we could either go with
21 the auditor or 3SG. So I think at this point we're
22 moving forward with the county auditor. We feel
23 comfortable in what they've proposed.

24 DIRECTOR LEONARD: We met the day
25 after the last Board meeting and had a very

1 productive meeting with them, a very quick
2 turnaround. They gave us a project plan and
3 outlined the tasks that they felt needed to be done
4 in order to meet the timetable we needed to review
5 the district boundaries. And I think you'll see
6 from the outline that they've -- already out of the
7 seven items that we outlined that needed to be done
8 before June 15th, that they've already got five of
9 those that are underway or completed.

10 So as I -- and -- based on the
11 meeting that we had with them I think everybody
12 walked away from that meeting feeling confident
13 that the auditor's office would be able to help us
14 with this particular project.

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Good. Thanks for
16 following up on that.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Thank you
18 for the recommendation. I don't believe we need
19 anything to pursue that.

20 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Just wanted to
21 keep you apprised.

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And then the
23 other item is the voting machine discussion. As
24 you know, we narrowed down the vendors to Hart and
25 to ES&S. And we are going to have both of those

1 vendors come to the county commissioners on the
2 26th of this month.

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.

4 Again, the day after the last Board
5 meeting, we met with the county administrative
6 staff, fiscal officer, county administrator, our
7 budget analyst, Gary Collins. He must have left
8 already. But we met with them and kind of outlined
9 what we had done to date and then what their
10 recommendations were for moving forward. Because,
11 obviously, the cost of the voting machine systems
12 are -- although a portion of it will come from
13 state funding, the balance would come from the
14 county and the commissioners will have to authorize
15 that money. And we wanted to make sure we were in
16 a position to answer any questions they might have
17 with regard to the system to go with.

18 So based on that recommendation we
19 set up an opportunity for the commissioners to have
20 a demonstration of each of the systems before we
21 finalize any decision on a recommendation going
22 forward. So we just wanted to make sure you all
23 were aware of that. Like I said, right now it
24 looks like it will be June 26th where each of the
25 commissioners will have an opportunity to see both

1 of the systems.

2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Are they having
3 it up here?

4 DIRECTOR LEONARD: No. It will
5 actually be down on the 26th floor where the
6 commissioners are. So if you happen to be down
7 there, stop by.

8 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And these
9 are the three systems that I believe all four Board
10 members saw.

11 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yeah. Right. It
12 will be the two optical scanner systems, ES&S's
13 optical scan system and Hart's optical scan system,
14 and then ES&S's touch screen solution.

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Do you know what
16 time of day?

17 DIRECTOR LEONARD: We expect it to
18 start by 10:00. We don't know what time the
19 commissioners will be available. I kind of told
20 the vendors be ready to start at 10:00 and it will
21 be more like whenever the commissioners are
22 available they will stop in.

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yeah. Not a
24 commissioners' meeting, but they're coming in
25 individually.

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MEMBER SINNOTT: I move we adjourn.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor signify by saying aye.

(Vote taken.)

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed, same sign.

(No response.)

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries. We are adjourned.

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Thereupon, the proceedings were concluded at approximately 3:42 p.m.
